



Angola

GENERAL INFORMATION

Angola is a country with an approximate area of 1247 thousand square kilometers (UNO, 2008). The population is 18,992,707 and the sex ratio (men per hundred women) is 98 (UNO, 2009). The proportion of the population under the age of 18 years is 50% and the proportion above age 60 is 3% (UNO, 2009). The literacy rate is 81% for men and 65% for women (UN Statistics, 2008). The life expectancy at birth is 48 years for males and 51 years for females (UNO, 2005-2010). The healthy life expectancy at birth is 44 years for males and 51 years for females (UNPD, 2010). The country is in the lower middle income group (based on 2010 World Bank criteria). The total expenditure on health as a percentage of gross domestic product is 4.56% and the per capita government expenditure on health (PPP int. \$) is \$100.0 (WHO, 2006). Suicide rate information is not available. In Angola, neuropsychiatric disorders are estimated to contribute to 4.3% of the global burden of disease (WHO, 2008).

GOVERNANCE

An officially approved mental health policy does not exist, however, mental health is specifically mentioned in the general health policy.

A mental health plan exists and was approved, or most recently revised, in 2010. The mental health plan components include:

- Timelines for the implementation of the mental health plan.
- Funding allocation for the implementation of half or more of the items in the mental health plan.

Dedicated mental health legislation does not exist, however, legal provisions concerning mental health are also covered in other laws (e.g. welfare, disability, general health legislation etc.).

FINANCING

Mental health and mental hospital expenditures by the government health department/ministry are not available.

Note: The health budget for the National Program is allocated by the National Directorate of Public Health (DNSP).

MENTAL HEALTH CARE DELIVERY

Primary Care

Prescription regulations authorize primary health care doctors and nurses to prescribe and/or to continue prescription of psychotherapeutic medicines but with restrictions. However, official policy does not permit primary health care nurses to independently diagnose and treat mental disorders within the primary care system.

The majority of primary health care doctors and nurses have received official in-service training on mental health within the last five years. Officially approved manuals on the management and treatment of mental disorders are available in the majority of primary health care clinics. Official referral procedures for

referring persons from primary care to secondary/tertiary care exist, as do referral procedures from tertiary/secondary care to primary care.
