## Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands

### GENERAL INFORMATION

Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands have an approximate area of 0.62 thousand square kilometers (UNO, 2008). The population is 62,000 and the sex ratio is unknown (UNO, 2009). It is in the High income group (based on 2010 World Bank criteria). The total expenditure on health as a percentage of gross domestic product is not known and the per capita government expenditure on health is unknown. Suicide rates and the global burden of disease of neuropsychiatric disorders are unknown.

### GOVERNANCE

An officially approved mental health policy exists and was approved or most recently revised in 1997. Mental health is not specifically mentioned in the general health policy.

A mental health plan does not exist.

Dedicated mental health legislation exists and it was initiated or most recently revised in 1994. Legal provisions concerning mental health are also covered in other laws (e.g., welfare, disability, general health legislation etc.).

### FINANCING

Precise mental health expenditures by the government health department/ministry are not available. However, it is estimated that approximately 1 % of total health budget is devoted to mental health.

### MENTAL HEALTH CARE DELIVERY

#### Primary Care

Prescription regulations authorize primary health care doctors to prescribe and/or to continue prescription of psychotherapeutic medicines. In contrast, the department of health does not authorize primary health care nurses to prescribe and/or to continue prescription of psychotherapeutic medicines. Likewise, official policy does not permit primary health care nurses to independently diagnose and treat mental disorders within the primary care system.

The majority of primary health care nurses have received official in-service training on mental health within the last five years. It is unknown whether the majority of primary health care doctors have received official in-service training on mental health within the last five years or whether officially approved manuals on the management and treatment of mental disorders are available in the majority of primary health care clinics. Official referral procedures for referring persons from primary care to secondary/tertiary care exist, as do referral procedures from tertiary/secondary care to primary care.
