Weekly Situational Update

10 – 16 August 2020

Highlights

- Weekly dispatches of essential medical items continue at pace, this week 45 countries were reached across all WHO regions.
- There has been a significant jump in diagnostics driven by PAHO, Brazil in particular.
- Significant progress has been made also in data management. All information provided by the CSCS supplying agencies is now accessible through a Power BI dashboard.

Consortia updates



Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- 79 million units have been purchased.
- 422 million units are being shipped of which 92 million units have been already delivered to affected countries.



Diagnostics

- 11.4 million manual tests and 3.2 million automated tests were delivered.
- Developed product selection criteria for manual PCR tests to add products to the Supply Chain catalogue.



Biomedical equipment

- 7,000 oxygen concentrators have been shipped.
- Approximately half the registered demand remains unmet due to the complexity of the equipment and the specific required for each country.

Figures include volumes secured through the consortium, as well as quantities purchased and allocated directly by the supplying agencies.
