Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) Situation Report 11 Philippines 28 March 2020



Data reported by the Department of Health on 28 March 2020

Highlights

- 272 new cases of COVID-19 confirmed on 28 March, compared to 96 cases on 27 March. 14 additional deaths reported on 26 March, and 9 on 27 March.
- Out of 1,075 confirmed cases, 44% are still under investigation. 62% are male, with people between 50 and 59 years of age among the most affected. 37% of cases are reported from the National Capital Region (NCR)
- Research Institute for Tropical Medicine (RITM) and sub national laboratories currently testing over 800 samples per day. Department of Health (DOH) to increase testing capacity at private hospital laboratories soon.
- DOH distributing available Personal Protection Equipment
 (PPE) to priority public hospitals. PPE shortage remains a
 major challenge, posing increased risk for health workers.
- WHO focus on rational use of PPE among hospital workers as well as hygiene promotion through nation-wide online training sessions to start next week. Training of Trainers for selected facilitators to be conducted on Monday 30 March.
- Stay at home remains key message to minimise further spread of disease. Focus is on self-quarantine for those with mild symptoms to decrease stress on hospitals.
- DOH to increase health workforce through online volunteer portal at bit.ly/COVID19DOH. DOH making COVID-19 hotline better accessible with additional staff and volunteers






Current Situation

On 28 March, 272 new cases of COVID-19 were confirmed in the Philippines, compared to 96 newly reported cases on 27 March. 14 additional deaths were reported on 28 March, compared to 9 on 27 March. There are currently 1,075 confirmed COVID-19 cases including 68 deaths in the country.





Out of total 68 deaths, 69% are male, ranging between 34 and 89 years of age with a median age of 54. 90% of deaths had either one or several known co-morbidities including diabetes, chronic kidney disease, hypertension, cardiac disease, bronchial asthma and cancer.

Among the 1,075 confirmed cases, 656 are male (62%) and 419 are female (38%). The most affected age groups are 51-60 (22%) followed by 61-70 years (21.7%)


Gender distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases in the Philippines in %

Country readiness and response operations

Country-level coordination

UN and NGO partners finalized the Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) COVID-19 response plan, aligned with ongoing government response clusters and interventions. The plan is to be presented to key government departments.

Many partners are increasingly concerned with the detrimental impact of ongoing restrictions due to the community quarantine, which may lead to a humanitarian crisis due to lack of access to food among marginalized communities, including the homeless, slum and displaced populations. At the same time, partners are supporting Local Government Units with setting up of tents as community quarantine facilities.

The Inter Cluster Coordination Group (ICCG) will focus on implementing the below recently published guidelines:

- Scaling-Up Covid-19 Outbreak Readiness and Response Operations in Humanitarian Situations, Including Camps and Camp-Like Settings (jointly developed by IFRC, IOM, UNHCR and WHO)
- Interim Recommendations for Adjusting Food Distribution Standard Operating Procedures in the Context of the COVID-19 Outbreak (developed by WFP)
- COVID-19: How to include marginalized and vulnerable people in risk communication and community engagement

Risk communication and community engagement

Key advise remains STAY AT HOME and while at home, to:

- (1) Eat a healthy and nutritious diet
- (2) Limit your alcohol consumption and avoid sugary drinks.
- (3) Don't smoke
- (4) Exercise
- (5) Look after your mental health
 - a. It's normal to feel stressed, confused, and scared during a crisis
 - b. Support other people in your community
 - c. Get your information from reliable sources once or twice a day

DOH has drafted its Interim Guidelines on the Implementation of Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) to be issued soon.

Surveillance

DOH is still looking for additional volunteers to support in contact tracing and case investigation, including for contact tracing teams at City Health Offices in NCR.

National laboratory system

DOH's Food and Drug Administration (FDA) now has registered 18 different types of COVID-19 Test Kits for commercial use. https://www.fda.gov.ph/covid-19-fda-updates/


DOH distributed the 100,000 test kits donated by the Chinese government among the below operational laboratories, current testing over 800 samples per day:

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Infection prevention and control

Online Training of Trainers on IPC for public and private hospitals workers will be conducted on 30 March based on the latest version of DOH's IPC guidelines for health workers and community, which is expected to be approved soon. Online live trainings will be conducted for all public and private hospitals shortly thereafter, to be followed by video-taped trainings made available on different training platforms, including DOH.



Case management and continuity of essential services

To ensure continuity of health services and access to medicines for vulnerable populations, DOH issued relevant guidelines allowing senior citizens and PWD to access up to 3 months of medicines except antibiotics.

Also, TB patients are urged to get up to 1 month of medicine to avoid daily visits to the health facility.

A survey conducted by UNAIDS among people living with HIV shows the need to better advocate with DOH and PhilHealth for continued access to sufficient quantities of drugs as well as condoms in NCR, Regions 3, 6, 11 and 12.



World Vision distributed 9 tents to hospitals and a prison

DOH is working with the National Privacy Commission to quickly bring onboard private providers of telemedicine services as part of the country's COVID-19 response. Telemedicine providers will interface with DOH, LGUs and volunteer physicians to provide primary care without physical contact through telecommunications technologies to lessen the case load of health facilities.

Relevant advisories on nutrition, pregnancy, childbirth and breastfeeding are being translated into local languages with support from UNICEF and UNFPA.

DOH updating its health facility database with key information on staff, services, and capacity including number of isolation units, ventilators to be made available through the WHO-led platform HeRAMS (Health Resources Availability Monitoring System) https://herams.org/

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

As of 23 March, WHO received more than US\$ 240.9 million and an additional US\$ 29.4 million in pledges to its global appeal. This includes €114 million from the European Union to support 80 priority countries with weakened health care systems and capacity including the Philippines.

Furthermore, 20 top business groups raised over 1.5 billion PHP in cooperation with the Philippine Disaster Resilience Foundation (PDRF) to help poor families that were economically displaced by the ongoing Enhanced Community Quarantine in Metro Manila.
